Conversation between Cameron MOFFAT and Kruse WELLWOOD

517 CM: Like, it's says for June. They're like asking me when I get bus passes,
518 and y'know.

519 KW: (Clears throat) They just seized my wallet. Well, they didn't seize it, but,
520 they have it. The only thing they seized was my iPod and my phone,
521 that's it. They also had uh, I also had two of my coins. There's one from
522 Singapore and the uh, lira, hundred lira. And my hat.

523 CM: They took your hat?

524 KW: Yeah. Well, they didn't seize it, right?

525 CM: Well, uh, no, I jus-, I'm saying they like, ... some stuff as evidence ... the
526 bus pass and- Eric the Kraut taken the bag 'cause that had uh ... one ...
527 write letters to my Mom and stuff.

528 KW: Yeah.

529 CM: Um, ... you can't have a pen ...

530 KW: Yeah. They let me write in the interview room. But that was just 'cause I
531 wanted to draw a diagram of how time travel in Primer worked. And
532 they're asking me things like um, if, if you had a machine, like, in that
533 Primer movie, and you could go back in time and change it all, would you?
534 I, I looked at her and said, the machine only worked in a space of six
535 hours. And I made so many smartass remarks, it pissed them off.

536 CM: Man, it's hot in here.

537 KW: (Sings) It's gettin' hot in here, so take off all your clothes. (Laughs)

538 CM: ... in the back, and we're like, butt naked, and ... how the fuck did you do
539 that?

540 KW: (Laughs) I could pull it off. Wait, no. Yeah, yeah.

541 CM: You could get butt naked, and put ... around your ankles ...

542 KW: (Laughs)

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543 CM: ...

544 KW: Oh.

545 CM: Aw dude, I hate being claustrophobic.

546 KW: I dunno, I don't really mind it, it's just that it's stuffy and I smell awful.

547 CM: I was more claustrophobic in my cell actually, than I am in here. Which is

548 kinda odd.

549 KW: I dunno. There's more room in my cell than I was expecting. Y'know I,

550 I'm-

551 CM: I'm with twelve by nine feet ...

552 KW: Oh, I got about um ...

553 CM: ...

554 KW: I got about ten by eight, maybe.

555 CM: With your feet, or just feet in general?

556 KW: Feet in general, I, 'cause I figured, y'know, my foot's about nine inches,

557 right? So-

558 CM: ...

559 KW: M-my, w-, my foot and then about a half is-

560 CM: Okay, well, twelve of my feet, without this fuckin' shoe on, by nine.

561 KW: Yeah.

562 CM: ...get out. I'm glad it's not fuckin' sunny right now.

563 KW: (Moans) Hey, you should do this, it makes it feel as if there's more room.

564 CM: No, I won't be able to get back up after. (Laughs)

565 KW: (Laughs) They're like, remorse, do you feel any remorse? Any, any

566 regrets? Any, anything inside of you, any remorse or regrets, any of,

567 remorse, any remorse? Remorse? Remorse. Did you feel remorse? I

568 couldn't help thinking about this funny comic I saw. It was like um, it was

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569 called Mo, and it's about this stupid guy named Mo, and there's this guy
570 named like, Sand-, Ce- Cement Bag Head, or something like that. He has
571 a cement bag for his head. And he ends up taking the fall for a, a murder
572 that Mo does. And then the, the guy's at the court, and, and he's like I
573 didn't do it. And the, the judge is like, yes, it's very interesting, but do you
574 feel any remorse, any regrets? Are you remorseful about it? And the
575 guy's like, but I didn't do- And he's like, remorse? Any remorse?
576 Remorse at all? He, he said, yes, I do. And then, (laughs) and the judge
577 is like, let him go. And then there's like streamers and stuff everywhere,
578 and the guy like, just walks out.

579 CM: What the fuck could this guy be doin'?

580 KW: Probably putting our um, stuff somewhere. Some kind of locker or
581 something.

582 CM: ... would be like, okay, they're here. Take them out, and then, y'know, the
583 rest should be handled by the juvie people.

584 KW: Uh, he probably has to do it himself.

585 CM: Makes me wonder why this is open, can't open it.

586 KW: I dunno, there could be longer trips, right? I mean, like, if it gets really
587 stuffy. They probably can open it from like, the other side or something.

588 CM: It opens inwards though.

589 KW: I know. Like, like they push it in.

590 CM: But it's also bolted on the outside.

591 KW: I dunno.

592 CM: I swear, they use these things for like, their dogs and then they're like,
593 hey, we can put prisoners in here, too.

594 KW: (Laughs). Michael said I'd probably be traveling by a shit can. (Laughs)

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595 CM: This what he meant.
596 KW: (Laughs) I think this is what he meant.
597 CM: Like, their windows here don't even open. So-
598 KW: Okay yeah, that, now I see what you mean.
599 CM: But they're bolted on the other side here. These open, those don't.
600 KW: Aw, dude, I have to fart.
601 CM: Don't you dare fart in here.
602 KW: (Laughs) This is funny that the only chance we get to talk is like, in here.
603 CM: ... Wonder what that thing is, that big box?
604 KW: Um, it's for putting your firearms in.
605 CM: I thought it was a ... controller or something.
606 KW: No. Or, no, maybe it's not putting, for putting your firearms in. It says you
607 just need to keep your firearms in your vehicle. Maybe it's for putting your
608 ammo in, then, because there's something about, on the cell block, it said
609 FA are not permitted and I asked what FA was, and he said fire arms.
610 And then it said something about um, y'know, retain your ammo, but
611 holster, or, yeah, like, place your firearms in the bin, or something like that.
612 CM: Um, all the police officers I saw in there, um had their gun holstered, but
613 um, there was no clip in them.
614 KW: Was that in the interview room?
615 CM: No, they never had guns in there. I'm just talking like when they were in
616 like, the receiving area, there, like that.
617 KW: Oh, you mean, like, the garage?
618 CM: No, like in the area where you ...
619 KW: The cell block?
620 CM: -and they take your picture.

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621 KW: Yeah, they-

622 CM: ... they came and took me out of my cell block. They all had firearms that

623 um, the clip was out of them.

624 KW: Y-y'know they guy that was yelling really loud? He sounded familiar.

625 CM: I thought it was with you, under the bed.

626 KW: (Laughs) No way, dude.

627 CM: Uh, maybe he's just sick of being in there and like fuck ... of shit.

628 KW: (Laughs) They stuck a what in here?

629 CM: ... fuck you?

630 KW: They stuck a what in here?

631 CM: -you.

632 KW: Or maybe it was Eric. Yeah, I, I almost wonder if it was a cop, though,

633 like, both of them. Because all they did was say the same things over and

634 over again.

635 CM: That's possible.

636 KW: What?

637 CM: That's possible.

638 KW: Still, y'know, could, could be a cop in-

639 CM: ...one's overweight, kind of ... slight over weight.

640 KW: Was she? I saw her and, I, I guess I didn't get a good look at her. But

641 she could've been, yeah. She's like, you've got the wrong person. My

642 boyfriend punched me in mouth. My husband punched me in the head.

643 CM: Eye and shoulder.

644 KW: What?

645 CM: ... her story changed, it was mouth, eye, shoulders.

646 KW: Yeah, and she said boyfriend, and then she said husband.

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647 CM: And then she said mouth and then she said eyes.

648 KW: Yeah, she said both husband and boyfriend, like, interchanged,

649 repeatedly.

650 CM: ... fucking ...

651 KW: They come back, we've just like, as-asphyxiated from like lack of uh,

652 oxygen. Well, shit. (Laughs)

653 CM: No, dude, fuckin'!

654 KW: No, I think you'd probably have about forty minutes before we use up all

655 the oxygen.

656 CM: Huh?

657 KW: I figure from the point we go in here, and they close it up, we have about

658 forty minutes of oxygen.

659 CM: What, it took us twenty minutes to drive here? ... or longer?

660 KW: Probably gonna pass out in half an hour from when we get in here. So uh,

661 yeah, we probably got about five minutes. (Laughs)

662 CM: ...

663 KW: (Laughs) I know, looks like there's holes here, though. A little bit of air

664 can come in.

665 CM: Yeah, like, yeah, but how much is the difference between the air now ...

666 KW: Yeah, you're right.

667 CM: Not to mention what kind of air current is there to cause circulation?

668 KW: Well, I learned in Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea, is that one

669 average human male uses one cubic litre of, of uh, air every hour. Maybe

670 it was one hundred cubic litres of air. Yeah, that sounds about right.

671 CM: Well, a litre um, is a liquid, right?

672 KW: Well, y'know.

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673 CM: Now I'm gonna fart.
674 KW: That wasn't what that just was, was it?
675 CM: No.
676 KW: Wh-what was that?
677 CM: Two point two.
678 KW: Okay.
679 CM: (Laughs)
680 KW: 'Cause I, I'm have like one apple as soon as I get in here and I'm just
681 gonna like, shit a fuckin' pile.
682 CM: (Groaning)
683 KW: You think we're gonna have anyone in uh, our cells with us?
684 CM: I dunno.
685 KW: Mm. You think we're gonna be in like, solitary the entire time?
686 CM: I dunno. Um, at most I think we'll ...
687 KW: The what?
688 CM: That brigade thing.
689 KW: Mm.
690 CM: Okay Kruse, we've got about three minutes left.
691 KW: So, I figure it's about ten-thirty or so.
692 CM: Um, yeah, probably.
693 KW: I was able to keep a pretty good idea about the time, because I know what
694 time the Dayliner comes. And-
695 CM: We have ... the light.
696 KW: Uh-
697 CM: -in your room?
698 KW: I have that, like, shitty square-

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699 CM: Yeah.
700 KW: -glass thing.
701 CM: Yeah.
702 KW: And uh, I knew the sun was setting around nine-thirty or ten, so-
703 CM: Yeah.
704 KW: And the sun was rising much earlier. And, they, they gave me breakfast at
705 eight, and dinner was around six, depending on, if I was being interviewed
706 or not. But if I was being interviewed the night, they'd tell me the time,
707 right? And then lunch came at noon.
708 CM: Those fuckin' muffins, I hate those things.
709 KW: Only one of them was really dry. And I ha-, I just dipped it in my coffee.
710 CM: All mine were really dry, and I usually get my coffee, like, after I'm done
711 my fuckin' muffin.
712 KW: I got, I got my muffin and my liquid at the same time. First muffin was
713 good, and the last muffin was good. Food was starting to make me ill,
714 though.
715 CM: The muffins were what made me ill. Those burgers weren't bad.
716 KW: They looked better than they were, though.
717 CM: The muffins smelled and looked great. Taste like shit ...
718 KW: Ah. I got really sick of the burger though, after awhile. The fuckin' bread's
719 all soggy and shit.
720 CM: Yeah.
721 KW: Aw, I'm done, I'm undoing these button. I don't give a shit about people
722 now.
723 CM: I just wanna get out of this fuckin' cage.
724 KW: (Laughs) This is funny.

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725 CM: I feel bad for dogs now.

726 KW: I, I feel really bad for my cats when they got put in the kennel.

727 CM: At least kennels have open circulation. I'm talkin' like, when you stick a

728 dog in somethin' like this.

729 KW: (Sighs) Let's use up all the oxygen so we can die. (Heavy breathing)

730 CM: That's a shitty way to die. 'Cause I took out a fuckin' paper clip and

731 jammed it in my wrist.

732 KW: You'll pass out before you die.

733 CM: It's still not a pleasant way to die.

734 KW: Every time that guard came by to like, check on me and stuff. I would like,

735 eyeball it, like, I could hear her coming, and I would just like look, and she,

736 she'd walk in, I would be like staring at her, I, even if I was sleeping, I was

737 like, I heard her, I just like open my eyes and just stare. (Laughs) She got

738 like, really a, nervous, 'cause I started like, y'know (bangs) sounding the

739 walls, y'know, tryin' to find out where it was hollow and stuff. A- after that,

740 she was like-

741 CM: Oh, my God.

742 KW: -comin', come in there every five minutes.

743 CM: ... let out, man.

744 KW: Hopefully.

745 CM: ...

746 UM: ...step on out. Watch your head ...

747 CM: Oh, fresh air.

748 UM: Oh, nice air, eh?

749 CM: Yeah.

750 UM: Damn it.

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
